# Unboxing

#### Contents of this kit

- **01. Tent** No tent, no camping; that's the rule.
- 02. Projector An open-air cinema? Let's watch a movie about art!
- 03. Diary Write down your observations.
- **04. Whistle** Blow it if you get lost.
- 05. Camping lantern A big part of the camping atmosphere.
- 06. Head torch Your hands deserve freedom!
- 07. Scrapbooking album Nature is art — you just need to collect it.
- **08. Markers** Draw what you see.
- 09. Colored tape To give your art an edge.
- 10. Decorative stickers Stick to the plan, and create a masterpiece.
- 11. Leaf-shaped sticky notes If you want to write on leaves, use these.

- 12. Shaped scissors We're done with straight lines.
- 13. Retro memo pad Vintage is awesome!
  - 14. Chalk For when you're tired of markers.
- 15. Thermos Never go camping without a thermos.
- 16. Bags For snacks and supplies.
- 17. Drawstring backpack Once it's packed, you HAVE to go camping.

18. Rainstick Bring the rain home, or even into your tent.

- **19. Rope** A rope is a must — ask Sam Gamgee.
- **20. Thermal rescue blanket** In case of emergency.

## **Notes and ideas**

What's the difference between camping in the forest and camping in your backyard? That's right — there's no difference if you can see the sky!

Eyes on the map

Before the camping begins, you need to choose a location. Ask the kids to draw a map of how to get there. For example, it could be a route from your home to the nearest park.

#### Get some food

Make some camping snacks, with the kids' help. Start with sandwiches and hot drinks in a thermos, and maybe you'll work up an appetite for something bigger in the process.

### Whistle while you walk

Whistles can help you and your kids communicate when you can't see each other. So you can use them to avoid getting lost in the forest.

It's best to read the instructions for the tent beforehand, so you know what you're doing when you're at the campsite. But remember even Mr. Rogers failed to put up a tent on the first try, and he didn't get discouraged! **Relax and listen** Close your eyes and listen. Can you hear it? Yes, that. That's the sound of life bustling around. Try listening like this at different times and in different locations.

#### **Active search**

Gather **natural materials** for your future masterpieces. Leaves, branches, stones **anything** you can find outside or in your backyard.

Remember to leave every place better than you found it. Don't break living branches — pick up the ones that are already on the ground.

Nature motivated people to produce **beautiful art** long before I decided to study psychology. So I don't need to explain why **nature drives our creativity**. What, you still don't get it? Because nature is already **inside** us.



#### Scrapbooking

Use the markers to draw a natural scene. It might be a landscape or just a combination of leaves and flowers. Then add the materials that you found outside.

#### Looks natural

Create **an image** from leaves, branches, and other items by gluing them to paper. Or just **arrange** them and take a picture.

#### **Grass doll**

Try making a grass doll. Or instead of a doll — how about weaving some grass bracelets that have the magic power to guard your family?

## The colors of the year

Draw a circle and divide it into twelve sectors — these are the months of the year. Ask your kids to fill the sectors with items of the color that best reflects each month.

#### By the fireside

When night falls, gather in the tent and turn on the lantern. This is your campfire. And now it's time to present your art and share stories. Maybe even some scary ones if you're not afraid of ghosts ... **Sorting leaves** Collect some leaves. Depending on the season, you can sort them according to **color or size**. Find out which trees the leaves fell from. The children can make an entire **scrapbook** of leaves, and draw leaf shapes on the pages with **crayons and markers**.

#### Toy photo session

Nature is the perfect backdrop for a photo shoot. Take some toys with you that can become models, and set up a camping photo studio. Start with sketches of the pictures you want to take, and then get your smartphone camera ready for a pro photography session.

#### Care for nature

Camping is not just a fun way to pass the time. It's also a chance to take care of nature. If you come across any litter dropped by other people, pick it up and take it to the trash can. Be an example to your kids. You can even turn it into a competition — who can fill their trash bag first? Don't forget to wear gloves!

#### **Mystery item**

Nature is full of undiscovered mysteries, and this is one of them. Let's hope it helps your creativity to flow!
